



What role did Ipswich play in the World Wars?

Miss Mary Caroline Coulcher C.B.E.

Mary Caroline Coulcher was born in Rickinghall Superior, Suffolk on 19th November 1852. Her father, Reverend George Coulcher, was the Rector of Wattisfield. In 1870, Mary Coulcher moved to Ipswich and founded the first St John Ambulance organisation in the town.

St John Ambulance organisation

The St John Ambulance organisation was founded in 1877 to provide first aid training so that people could provide on-the-spot treatment in emergencies.

It is a charitable organisation that is still operated by volunteers. In 1877, the volunteers were organised into a Brigade to provide first aid and an ambulance service at public events. At the time, St John Ambulance was providing the only ambulance service in the country and would be the only provider until 1948 when the NHS was founded.

Mary Caroline Coulcher made many contributions to the town of Ipswich including being the first female town councillor from 1909 to 1912 and also helping fund the purchase of the town's first motorised ambulance.

During World War I, Mary Caroline Coulcher ran Broadwater Hospital and the isolation hospital at Gippeswyk Hall.

After the war, she was awarded an O.B.E and a C.B.E. These awards were given by King George V.

She died at the age of 72 on the 15th of June 1925.

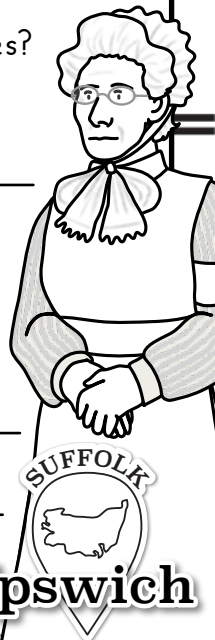

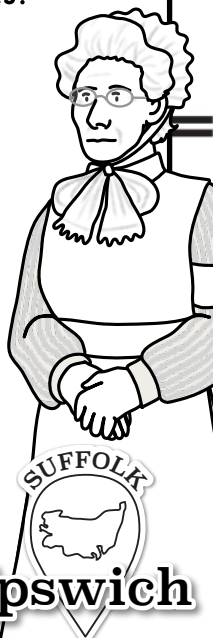
